The following reflects the conference call meeting on August 4

- Treasurer's Report The treasurer's report by acting treasurer, Donna Hurst, reflects a July ending checking balance of \$1,400.18 and CD balance of \$9,745.65 for a total of \$11,153.83. The report was accepted as reported.
- 2nd Quarter Budget Report John Bolinski reported the 2nd quarter YTD cash-flow in as \$14,421.05 and out as \$12,504.29 for a net positive cash flow of plus \$1,916.76, which was mostly from the Pleasure Show proceeds.

-NOT AN ORDINARY DAY ON THE FARM By Frances Baker

—The DDC Hosts a Driver Proficiency Testing Program with Muffy Seaton at Wayne & Frances Baker's Hollyville Farm in Lewes DE on August 6-8, 2010.

When Jane Ramsey came up with the idea for this clinic, I agreed it was a great idea. I quickly offered to host the clinician and the event at our farm. It seemed to be a great way to take the next level (2) myself, having taken the first level at the Carriage Association Learning Weekend at Gloria Austin's in FL using a rented horse. A nice, but brief experience. With the date set, arrangements made with Muffy Seaton, Jane and I began to wonder how we could fill the whole weekend. We each made a few phone calls to other drivers we thought would be interested and the clinic quickly filled, with a waiting list to spare. Then I ordered the level 2 book for myself and got my first surprise, as this level had 9 units. I was advised to pick one or two as the whole level would take forever.

Next, the scheduling began with Jane making many phone calls to Jill Ryder at the CAA and emails to Muffy. I think they offered something like "good luck". Somehow, Jane came up with a schedule for 8 participants covering 15 individual units. The weather offered an additional challenge with very little rain and above average temperatures. I decided to do as much of the testing as we could in our wooded trails out of the hot mid-day sun. But first we had to drive under our working irrigation system which is 10-12 ft high with drop spouts reaching down to just over the average driver's head. The spouts deliver a refreshing sprinkle of ice cold water but it is always a surprise none the less. The drivers all survived the challenge. Much was learned in the process of testing. My strongest part was pair driving through our wooded trails. My weakest part was the single horse dressage test 1— as I mostly drive pairs and fours.

Muffy cautioned me that my team of four was only as "as good as the worst horse—a good reason to do more single horse dressage in the future.

Thanks to Jane Ramsey and all of her hard work putting this plan into action and Thank You to everyone who participated and to the DDC for supporting it. See photos on page 4

DDC Member, Michele Novack, Does Driving Demo for MD State 4-H Youth Camp—Michele Novack

In the late afternoon on Thursday, July 8, in the searing heat, Michele and her nine-year old part-bred Cleveland Bay mare, Liberty (Libby), gave a carriage driving demo to over 150 junior and senior 4-**H**′rs at the annual Jamboree, an educational camp for those who participate in the Horse and Pony Project. The event was held at Patuxent River Park in Queen Anne, Prince George's Cty, near Upper Marlboro, MD.

I was told in advance that the kids were excited and curious about driving, then I show up and unload this HUGE horse with big ears — 'A Cleveland What?" So I gave a brief history lesson on the breed and all the efforts underway to help bring the breed back. This was all a bonus—the kids had all kinds of good questions. Then I let the kids hold Libby under a big shade tree while I got the carriage and harness unloaded. My helpers and I figured that the kids should also see how much of an effort it is to move all the gear around. Libby was very patient while I explained about how the carriage and harness parts work together. I then harnessed and hitched to the marathon cart while making sure I did everything to ADS standards. I then climbed onto the box seat, gloves on and off we went. Due to the heat, we only did some basic maneuvers at walk and a little trot work. A nice breeze came up and Lib did her best road trot this year, thundering across the parched field and then an obedient halt and stand for the last round of questions. As the kids headed off to the dining hall for dinner, I loaded the moms up on the cart for an easy ride around the demo field. None had ever had that experience before and they loved it. As we packed up and prepared to load for the trip home, I was presented with a handmade thank-you note signed by all of the kids with a question at the bottom — can you please come back next year? "Of Course"

Libby is a graduate of the Bill Long Driving Center in Southern Pines, NC where she spend the summer in

There has been a MAJOR increase in the instance of Potomac Horse Fever in the area—so much so that New Bolton and the American Association of Equine Practitioners have both separately sent warnings to vets about it.

Although we don't usually think of it as being on Delmarva, possible cases around the Mid-Atlantic region in general have not been confirmed pending test results.

Helpful Horse Hints

From the Delaware Equine News August 2010 edition:

(Just substitute 'drive' for 'ride'

When is it TOO HOT to ride?
Air Temperature + Relative Humidity—
Wind Speed = Answer
To evaluate your answer:
180 or above—Don't Ride!
130-170—Use Caution
130 or below—Ride

- 10 Signs That Your Dressage Test Needs Some Work
- 1. Under judge's remarks, the only comment is: "Nice Plaits"
- 2. Your horse confuses the dressage arena boards for a cavaletti and exits over them.
- 3. Your 20 meter circle reminds the judge to buy eggs on her way home.
- 4. Your serpentine was perfect, except that it was supposed to be a straight entry on the center line.
- 5. Slow trot would have been more acceptable at the Harrington Race Track
- 6. Your horse believes that "free walk" means grazing along the arena boards.
- 7. You work harder than your horse to maintain a 'working trot'.
- 8. During the salute, you inadvertently use your ship hand and your horse thinks the horseflies are biting.
- 9. Your horse's walk seems to be more 'rare' than 'medium'.
- 10. Impulsion in improved only after the horse sees monsters in the decorative conifers near the letter marking the dressage arena.

Do you know YOUR county government have zoning ordinances s that unfairly apply to horse farms?




